"Purple Martins & Tejon Ranch" Mike White, Tejon Ranch Conservancy



Dr. Mike White, Conservation Science Director for the Tejon Ranch Conservancy, will present a fascinating look at Purple Martins, a member of the swallow family and a colony-dwelling bird that is rare in California. It is a designated Species of Special Concern. While eastern birds nest almost exclusively in manmade boxes, California Purple Martins nest mainly in natural cavities in trees. Surveys have found nesting colonies in the Tehachapi mountains and more recently on Tejon Ranch, where they nest mostly in large valley oaks. These sites have been designated as Audubon "Important Bird Areas."

Mike White, an experienced birder and naturalist, earned his doctorate in a joint program at UC Davis and San Diego State University. He has over 20 years of professional experience in conservation planning, environmental regulations and ecosystem management and has served as lead biologist for many high-visibility projects, including the Lower Colorado River Multiple Species Conservation program and as technical advisor to the environmental groups that negotiated the landmark 2006 Tejon Ranch Conservation & Land Use Agreement conserving up to 90% of the 270,000 acre ranch.

Join us for an informative evening on Purple Martins and an update on the Tejon Ranch Conservancy and its conservation efforts!

APRIL FIELD TRIPS

Alison Sheehy, Kern River Preserve Outreach Coordinator and excellent birder, will lead this field trip to one of Kern County's best spots to see spring migrants. Meet at Costco/Rosedale parking lot near gas station; return by 3pm. Bring snacks, lunch, water. Tricolored Blackbird Survey April 15-17, 2011

This April, as part of Audubon California's effort to help save one of California's most sensitive birds, volunteers will scour California for Tricolored Blackbird and our help is needed!

Audubon California and the Tricolored Blackbird Working Group will conduct the triennial statewide survey April 15-17 to estimate the current population of this imperiled species. Volunteers will survey known, historical colony sites as well as scout for new colonies that have escaped detection. No prior experience is necessary and any help, big or small, is welcome.

To prepare for the survey, a training session will be held to learn the basics of surveying. Wondering how to ID a Tricolored vs. a Red-winged Blackbird? Or how to accurately estimate the size of a 60,000 bird megacolony? These are the types of questions that will be answered at the training.

BIRDING ARIZONA WITH MICHAEL MCQUERRY

Southeast Arizona is legendary in US birding. The mountains of Mexico extend just into Arizona in the form of the "Sky Islands" of soaring mountains: Huachuca's, Chiricahua's, the Santa Rita's. The birds of Mexico and Central America follow these mountains into the US only in Arizona. There are neary 100 species which occur nowhere else in the United States. Michael McQuerry, Kern Audubon member and frequent field trip leader, has birded southeastern Arizona for 30 years and will lead a July birding trip for Kern Audubon July 23-30. AMERICA'S BIRDIEST INLAND COUNTY COMPETITION: APRIL 29 - MAY 1, 2011

For the past seven years, Kern County has been recognized as the nation's "birdiest inland county" in the annual Birdiest County competition. Last year's total was 242 species and in 2009, 246 species. The 2011 Kern County effort will take place over 72 consecutive hours from Friday through Sunday, April 29 - May 1. All bird species observed by anyone during any of the 72 consecutive hours may be contributed to the overall list to be submitted ... as long as the detections are made in Kern County.



HAPPY BELATED 50TH BIRTHDAY

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In 1960, the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge was established by Congress and signed by President Eisenhower, just one year after Alaska was granted statehood. From this first effort to perverse the natural wonders of Alaska, many other wildlife refuges, national parks, and wildness areas have been established. The article below gives perspective to the importance of this golden anniversary.

Statement of Audubon President David Yarnold on the 50th Anniversary of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge:

"Protecting wild Alaska was bold and audacious 50 years ago. Defending it today is even more important. The Eisenhower administration's establishment of the Arctic National Wildlife Range in 1960 recognized the importance of 'America's Serengeti' to both wildlife and the human spirit. It was a visionary act – not only in the protections that it has provided for more than 180 species of birds, 36 species of land mammals, and nine marine mammals, but in its awareness that future generations deserve and need an opportunity to be inspired by the enduring presence of wilderness. Today, Audubon joins people across our nation and around the globe to celebrate the beauty, diversity, and unadorned splendor of this unique place, now known as the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge. We also honor the foresight and commitment of those who took the first action to protect it.

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"It is now up to us to make sure that one of the most untouched Arctic ecosystems in America remains intact. The combination of climate change and oil and gas development poses a "double threat" to America's Arctic wildlife and wildlands. Warming temperatures are already causing significant ecological disruption, while industrial oil and gas development imperil species like the polar bear and migratory caribou. At risk is the biological heart of the Arctic Refuge, the 1.5 million acre Coastal Plain. Even though it includes some of the best polar bear denning and caribou calving habitat on the entire North Slope, this vital area lacks permanent protection.

"Audubon and our grassroots supporters, along with many other dedicated conservationists, have worked long and hard to keep the Refuge safe from oil and gas drilling. Now, we call on our nation's leaders to continue the work their predecessors began five decades ago, by extending permanent protection to the Coastal Plain. As we celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, we must take this historic opportunity to take the next critical step to preserve America's great Arctic wilderness."

Now in its second century, Audubon is dedicated to protecting birds and other wildlife and the habitat that supports them. Our national network of community-based nature centers and chapters, scientific and educational programs, and advocacy on behalf of areas sustaining important bird populations, engage millions of people of all ages and backgrounds in conservation. Audubon....where birds matter!
