The Kern River Valley and surrounding mountains of the Southern Sierra Nevada have become internationally known birding areas visited by birders from around North America and, indeed, the world. Because of the area's importance to native birds, the South Fork Kern River Valley and portions of the surrounding Sequoia National Forest have also been designated Globally Important Bird Areas by the National Audubon Society.

Through bird and scenic images, Bob Barnes will take us through the birding year in this world class birding area. Join us and learn about the many special birding spots and some of the incredible birds they host....spots you may visit and birds you might see in Kern County's backyard.

Bob Barnes is a phenomenal birder and teacher who has led 250 formal birding trips in the Kern River Valley/So Sierras area over the past 30 years. He is past Director of Bird Conservation for Audubon California and past Chair of California Partners in Flight. He's been an active member of and officer for Tulare County Audubon and as President of California Wilderness Coalition, served as catalyst for protection of the South Fork Kern River watershed through his work with various governmental and environmental organizations.

Bob has led many field trips for Kern Audubon, including one scheduled for Sunday Sept. 19th (see below) and we are honored to have him present this program to begin our Fall schedule. Come and enjoy his program on Kern County's special birding regions and realize the opportunities for personal exploration close at hand!



Birding Field Trip

SUN. SEPT 19, 7:30AM – HART PARK/LAKE MING

Join Kern Audubon for the first of Fall field trip to observe & identify resident and migratory birds at Hart Park, Kern River Campground and Lake Ming. WINDMILLS & BIRDS

The enXco company, based in Santa Monica, is in the process of applying for permission to construct a 8,300 acre wind farm, with 250 1 megawatt towers, to produce renewable energy. The Audubon Society is a strong proponent of wind farms and the concept that renewable energy is far better than a fossil fuel dependent generator of electricity. Our concern is the inevitable bird kills associated with 450 foot rotor blades. The company has done extensive surveys of the property that is directly west of Rosamond, noting migratory bird routes and raptor nests and foraging patterns. Even though the area is low in both categories, Audubon and the Kern County Planning Department are asking for a five year monitoring phase after construction to see how many birds and bats are killed. The key issue is that wind farm technology and siting formulas have improved in the past two decades and that future improvements will continue to reduce avian mortality. We are hoping that prescribed monitoring, by an independent biologist, will reduce bird kills and improve the technology. We know that global climate change is also a threat to bird populations. Reduction of carbon dioxide in the air will help to reverse this change. A vote on the final EIR goes to the Planning Commission on September 7. AUDUBON ANNOUNCES NEW PRESIDENT/CEO

New York, NY - The National Audubon Society has announced that David Yarnold has been named its new President and Chief Executive Officer, giving new momentum to efforts to connect people with nature and their power to protect it. A passionate conservationist, Yarnold currently serves as Executive Director of Environmental Defense Fund and President of Environmental Defense Action Fund. Prior to that, he was a Pulitzer Prize-winning editor at the *San Jose Mercury News*.

"David brings proven leadership in the for-profit and non-profit sectors to Audubon at a time when efforts to protect birds, habitats and the resources that sustain us are needed more than ever;" said Holt Thrasher, Audubon's Board Chair. "His leadership ability, his passion for conservation and grassroots action, his communications skills and his organizational expertise all make him the perfect fit for the Audubon of 2010 and beyond."

"David is a boundary-crosser, the kind of flexible thinker and values-based executive that a complex conservation and fundraising landscape demands right now," Thrasher said. "He shares Audubon's traditional passion for birds and its visionary understanding that helping people to protect them will safeguard our own future as well. I have no doubt that David will lead Audubon in expanding its reach to new audiences and elevating its conservation successes to new heights." .

"Audubon's mission has never been more relevant. From the grassroots to state houses to national and regional policy, its wingspan is unparalleled," Yarnold said. "I'm excited by the opportunity to work with a nationwide network of Audubon Chapters and Audubon Centers that combine local concern, knowledge and action to equal conservation that makes a difference on a grand scale. It will be an honor to lead an organization whose name has meant 'trust' and 'conservation achievement' for more than a hundred years."

Yarnold's *San Jose Mercury News* was consistently ranked as one of America's 10 Best Newspapers and was called, "America's Boldest Newspaper" by a panel of international judges. During his time in San Jose, the Mercury News was widely recognized for its commitment to diversity and for its in-depth coverage of technology. He was also one of three Pulitzer Prize finalists for editorial writing in 2005.

"For me, going to Audubon is like going home. Community-based education and action that breeds broader changes has always been engaging and rewarding for me and those are the things Audubon does best," Yarnold said.

He will assume the Presidency of Audubon on Sept 1.

Prop 21: A LEGACY FOR CALIFORNIA STATE PARKS

Did you know that 52 Audubon California Important Bird Areas are at least partially owned by California State Parks, totaling 156,000 acres?



Audubon California, The Nature Conservancy, Save the Redwood League and California State Parks Foundation are sponsors of The State Parks & Wildlife Conservation Trust Fund Act ("State Parks Initiative") appearing on the November 2, 2010 statewide ballot as Proposition 21.

Prop 21 works like this-

- Vehicles registered in California will get a free, year round day use admission to all California state parks in exchange for a new annual \$18 vehicle license fee, a considerable savings if you go to more than two State parks in a year.
- The funding will provide a stable, reliable and adequate source of funding for the state park system, for wildlife conservation and for increased and equitable access to those resources for all Californians.
- The parks budget will no longer be subject to cuts by the legislature or the Governor, the Trust Fund cannot be borrowed from or raided, and our state Parks can begin work on acquisitions and deferred maintenance once the funds become available.

The passage of this proposition is a conservation legacy that all of us Audubon members in California can leave to future generations!

Ross Hawkins, Hummingbird Society

One of the world's leading advocates and recognized authority on hummingbirds and featuring amazing images of these birds.

Public welcome...come early for a good seat!

Although trained as a research scientist (chemistry), Ross Hawkins early decided his real future lay in investments and spent most of his working career as a stockbroker for Morgan Stanley Dean Witter. Fate intervened, however, when his wife, Beth, introduced him to the amazing world of hummingbirds in 1988. He was never the same again! In 1996, after diligent study and after determining that no organization was focused on hummingbird conservation (despite the fact that about 10% of all the 329 hummingbird species were endangered), he founded the nonprofit Hummingbird Society. Just a few years later, he took early retirement from his stock market career to devote himself full time to the Society.

Currently the Hummingbird Society is working with several partners to plan and execute projects aimed at preventing extinction of three Critically Endangered hummingbird species: The Juan Fernandez Firecrown (Chile), the Honduran Emerald (Honduras), and the Colorful Puffleg (Colombia).
