CALIFORNIA CONDOR OUTREACH & VIEWING BOOTH

The Friends of the California Condors Wild & Free has a summer outreach booth on Cerro Noroeste Rd where it runs through Bitter Creek Nat'l Wildlife Refuge. This is an opportunity to learn about California Condors and possibly see some in the wild! The booth operates on the 1st & 3rd Saturdays, 8am - 3pm trhough September and is located at the upper Bitter Creek NWR sign on Cerro Noroeste Rd. between Maricopa and Pine Mountain Club. Take I-5 to CA 166 toward Taft. Follow CA-166 about 33 miles then left on Cerro Noroeste Rd. past Maricopa. The booth is about 9 miles at the second Bitter Creek NWR sign.

Central Valley Bird Symposium

On November 15th-18th, 2012, the Central Valley Bird Club will host the 16th Annual Central Valley Birding Symposium at the Stockton Hilton in Stockton, CA. Exciting guest speakers, workshops and field trips highlight this 4 day symposium that is open to the public. Keynote speakers include Ed Harper on "Appreciating the Birds of the Central Valley"; Sophie Webb on "Seabirds & Marine Mammals of the Tropical Eastern Pacific"; and Carlos Bettancourt on "The Natural Spendor of the Panama Canal." HUMMINGBIRD FEEDERS

Hummingbird solution needs to be changed frequently in the summer as it sours quickly in the heat. Please refresh your solution every 3-4 days, cleaning feeders with a light mix ture of vinegar and water. Spoiled sugar water is bad for the birds!



Remember to use a sugar solution of 4 parts HOT water to one part sugar (e.g. 1 cup boiled water/1/4 cup white sugar). Red coloring is unnecessary and never use honey. Extra solution can be stored in the refrigerator for up to 10 days.





PROPOSED OHV STATE PARK IN MOJAVE DESERT

The California State Parks has a division called OHV: Off Highway Vehicles. The division plans and builds riding parks for OHV riders. The funds for this effort come entirely from fees riders pay when they purchase an OHV. The reference 'green sticker funds' is commonly used. Millions of dollars are generated from this fund. The closest State OHV Park to Bakersfield is the Hungry Valley OHV facility near Gorman.

The parks division is currently looking at property near Jawbone Canyon, south and west of Red Rock State Park, off of Highway 14. Much of the land is currently being used by OHV riders. The difference is that an OHV state park regulates riding and limits the scope of the trails. The parcels are split between private party owner and BLM ownership. The public process has just begun, with the first meeting of interested groups held on August 3, which was attended by Harry Love, Kern Audubon's Conservation Chair. Dialog between the different interest groups was the intent of the meeting. Of concern to Audubon is the protection of Butterbredt Springs, a Globally Important Bird Area, which is just to the north of the proposed property.

There will be many more meetings prior to the issuing of a draft environmental impact report (DEIR). This document will consist of a full inventory of the current land as to vegetation, animals, and birds. You will be kept informed about issues raised on the DEIR when it becomes available. WIND FARMS IN TEHACHAPI: Upcoming meeting

For many years, the Kern Audubon Society has been concerned about the number of birds being killed by wind turbines and the proliferation of wind farms both near Tehachapi and beyond. Earlier this year the Board of Supervisors asked the Planning Department to develop an 'exclusion' map, indicating where there would be no wind farms allowed in the county. The intent is to tell both land owners and the wind farm industry that certain areas of the county are 'off limit' to wind farms.

The tentative map was proposed and public meetings were held in Mojave, Rosamond, and Tehachapi in August to get input from residents. Based on the comments, the maps were revised. On September 25, at 2 PM, at the County Building on Truxtun, the Board of Supervisors will listen to public comments and then vote on the final version of the map. Please come to the meeting! Renewable energy, both wind and solar, is a major economic factor for the county and the state. Now is the chance to get it done 'right'! Public input is important. I hope you can attend.

US FISH & WILDLIFE SERVICE ADOPTS AUDUBON MODEL

A LETTER FROM DAVID YARNOLD, PRESIDENT, NATIONAL AUDUBON SOCIETY:

In the face of truly epic challenges to birds, habitat and human health, we know that large-scale action is needed to complement local conservation efforts. In order to do that, we're committed to building powerful partnerships. And we can't imagine a more potent partner than the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service itself. So, here's the big news: Audubon's innovative conservation approach is being adopted by the F&WS as a national model.

What persuaded the F&WS was the core-habitat strategy we pioneered to protect Greater Sage-Grouse and the vulnerable sagebrush ecosystem. That concept has been embraced by the F&WS for expansion to other imperiled species and habitat. Audubon Chapters, which provide a large-scale framework for focused collaboration across our network, will play a vital role in the implementation of this effort.

Audubon's work has already led to protection of 15 million acres (and growing) in the American West, and laid the groundwork for shaping responsible energy development in the region. This fall, it will be the focus of a forum of conservation leaders Audubon is hosting in collaboration with the F&WS as well as the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation.

Our policy, science and conservation teams are leading identification of additional Audubon priority species that fit the Sage-Grouse model. Like the Greater Sage-Grouse, each will 1) be an effective environmental barometer and ambassador for critical habitat; 2) have the potential for landscape-level outcomes; 3) possess strong data that can guide conservation; 3) be able to generate motivation for key stakeholders seeking conservation solutions.

Audubon's Flyway science leads have identified nine key species:

Western Sandpiper and Black Brant (Pacific) Lesser Prairie Chicken and Mountain Plover (Central) Wilson's Plover and Cerulean Warbler (Mississippi) Golden-winged Warbler and Piping Plover (Atlantic) Yellow-billed Cuckoo (Western Rivers)

The F&WS's response to this proposed list of species was enthusiastic. And the agency's director, Dan Ashe, has shared the following in a recent letter to me: "I see great potential in cooperating with Audubon to develop common speciesbased objectives, and to work together to ensure landscape-scale conservation is achieved." This is an inspiring demonstration of how Audubon's new strategic plan is helping to define, drive, and deliver conservation impact at scale. We look forward to working with chapters as it unfolds.
