Sat. December 1st, 7:00am - Techachapi Birding

Join Kern Audubon for a field trip to be led by Richard Sparks of the Tehachapi Mountains Birding Club. Meet at 7:00 a.m. for carpooling at the Shell Station/Jack in the Box on the northeast corner of Brundage and Union (Union exit off Hiway 58), departing at 7:10 and returning by 1:00pm. Richard is webmaster and acting field trip coordinator for the club and an experienced birder. The trip will include several lakes and uplands sites with comfortable walking and relatively short distances. Bring water, snacks, binoculars and warm clothing, including hats and gloves. Thermos' of hot coffee or chocolate will be welcome! Call Roger Coley (832-1829) for further information.

FOR THE BIRDS ...

If you missed the recent field trip to the Pixley Nat'l Wildlife Refuge to view the Sandhill cranes which winter there, it is not too late to make the trip and well-worth the adventure! Pixley is home to one of the southern San Joaquin Valley wintering flocks and is the best place to see the cranes.

There are two sub-species of the Sandhill crane: Greater and Lesser. The Lesser is the more abundant of the species and nests predominantly in Alaska, while the Greater nests in northeastern California, eastern Oregon and eastern Washington. Approximately 2,000 of these threatened birds winter in the agricultural fields surrounding Pixley NWR.

The best viewing time is the half-hour before and after sunset when the birds fly onto the refuge to spend the night. It is truly a spectacular sight when the birds fly over your head and you hear their other-wordly sounds!

The drive to Pixley is about 45 minutes from Bakersfield. Take the Alpaugh/Ducor exit at Earimart (8miles north of Delano) and drive west on Sierra Ave. 5.7 miles until you get to Road 88. It is marked with a Pixley NWR sign. Turn right and go about a mile to a parking lot on the left. The trail is a gravel road and when you come to a fork in the road, bear to the right and go approx. 1/2 mile to the viewing platform.

All you have to do is register on the website as a new user and follow the instructions. Interactive maps and graphs are provided. Andrea Jones, IBA Coordinator for Audubon CA strongly recommends that Kern Auduboners get involved by visiting the website and recording our bird sightings!

WHAT TO DO WITH A DEAD BIRD

If you find a dead bird in your backyard, contact the "Dead Bird Hotline" (1-877-968-2473). Do not touch the bird but use a plastic bag to pick it up and then double bag it. If the bird has been dead less than 12 hours, the hotline folks will arrange for it to be picked up and tested for West Nile virus. If not, dispose of the bird in the trash.

SEWER POND BIRDING


Two good sights for viewing waterfowl and shorebirds are the City & County waste water ponds, located south of Hiway 58 between Mt. Vernon and Oswell at two different locations. Permission to bird is needed, so call or sign-in.

Bakersfield City ponds: 832-2851and ask for the supervisor. Ponds are located on Mt. Vernon south of Hiway 58 past the recycling /green waste area.

Kern County ponds: 837-0827 and ask for Pat. Take Oswell off Hiway 58 and turn right one block south of freeway onto Kimber. Follow Kimber until it ends at the waste water treatment plant. Go into office to check-in.

Call 1-800-327-BAND (2263) - Bird Banding Lab You keep the band and will be sent a certificate of appreciation with information about the bird. By reporting band numbers you will be helping to manage our continental waterfowl resource. When you call the Bird Banding Lab, they will ask when and where you encountered the bird and then can tell you when and where the bird was banded.

Window Bird Alert



Thousands of birds are killed each year from flying into home windows. Window Alert is a low-tack decal that reflects ultraviolet sunlight invisible to humans but not to birds. Kern Audubon Re-Certified for 2008

As a result of Madi Elsea's submission of our Annual Chapter Report for 2007, National Audubon has re-certified our Chapter for this year. This means, among other things, that the Chapter will receive baseline funding in the amount of \$962 for 2008. The notification letter from Lynn Tennefoss, Audubon Vice-president, State Programs and Chapter Services, also informed us that the Membership Incentive Program will continue, which means Kern Audubon will receive 100% (\$20) of the first year's membership paid by each **new** National Audubon Society member who joins our chapter.

In the past year we have welcomed many great new members and we look forward to more this year. More active members means more participants and more financial support that will allow us to increase our activities in support of Kern Audubon's mission: *to create a culture of conservation in Kern County.*

Don't Toss that Fluorescent Lamp!



There is a growing use of compact fluorescent lamps as replacement for incandescent bulbs. Pacific Gas and Electric has subsidized the products so you can buy them for less than 50 cents each and even get them free at PG&E giveaways, such as at CSUB this week. Advantages of CFLs are: they last longer, use far ess energy, produce less heat. Now, they also come in different colors and some are dimmable, unlike most older fluorescents.

However, all fluorescent lamps contain a small amount of mercury and if they are tossed in the trash and carried to the landfill, the poisonous metal will eventually wind up in water sources and be a potential killer.

So, it is important to recycle as hazardous waste our burned-out flourescent bulbs/lamps. Take them to the Kern County Special Waste Facility at 4951 Standard St., Thursday-Friday, 10AM-4PM or Saturday 8AM-4PM (info: 862-8900). While there, check out the paint and finishing materials (some in unopened cans) that have been brought in: paints, sealers, wood stains and varnishes - AND THEY ARE FREE!

Kern Legislators Turn in Mixed Performance on the Environment

In November the California League of Conservation Voters (CLCV) released their annual California Environmental Scorecard, based on the voting records of the 2007 legislature.

Senator Dean Florez (D-Shafter) emerged as the clear environmental leader among the Kern County delegation, with a rating of 77%. Although far better than any of his Kern colleagues, Florez's record was weaker than the average Senate Democrat's 89% rating.

At 35%, **Assemblymember Nicole Parra** (D-Hanford) was tied for the lowest score among all Assembly Democrats—far below their average rating of 94%.

Kern's Republicans lagged far in the rear. **Senator Roy Ashburn** (R-Bakersfield) voted in favor of the environment only 5% of the time, managing to put him below the already poor 9% average of Senate Republicans. At 5%, **Assemblymember Jean Fuller's** voting record matched the dismal average performance of Assembly Republicans on environmental issues.

Meanwhile, Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger (R) earned a 63% rating, his highest since taking office.

Bills on the CLCV scorecard addressed such issues as condor protection, reform of the San Joaquin Valley air board, "green" buildings, flood protection, dredge mining, and alternative fuels.

Kern Bird Species Featured in Audubon WatchList

On November 28, the National Audubon Society issued its 2007 WatchList, a joint effort of Audubon and the American Bird Conservancy, and it includes those species in the United States that are in the greatest need of immediate conservation help. The list divides birds into two color categories: RED for those of the greatest concern, and YELLOW for seriously declining or rare species. The lists are based on data obtained through Audubon's annual Christmas Bird Count and the Breeding Bird Survey.

Unfortunately, many Kern birds made the list this year:
